Instructions to Voters:

- Use only a blue or black ballpoint pen to mark your choices.
- You must connect the head and tail of the arrow for your vote to count. You only need to draw one line.



- To vote for a qualified write-in candidate, write the person's name on the blank line provided and connect the head and tail of the arrow. The law does not allow write-ins for voter-nominated offices.
- If you make a mistake, ask a poll worker for another ballot. If you are voting by mail, follow the instructions you received with your ballot.

Party-Nominated Offices

The party label accompanying the name of a candidate for party-nominated office on the general election ballot means that the candidate is the official nominee of the party shown.

Voter-Nominated and Nonpartisan Offices

All voters, regardless of the party preference they disclosed upon registration, or refusal to disclose a party preference, may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated or nonpartisan office.

The party preference, if any, designated by a candidate for a voter-nominated office is selected by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not imply that the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party or that the party approves of the candidate. The party preference, if any, of a candidate for a nonpartisan office does not appear on the ballot.

CRIMINAL SENTENCES. PAROLE. **JUVENILE CRIMINAL** 57 **PROCEEDINGS AND** SENTENCING. INITIATIVE

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AND STATUTE. Allows parole consideration for nonviolent felons. Authorizes sentence credits for rehabilitation, good behavior, and education. Provides juvenile court judge decides whether juvenile will be prosecuted as adult. Fiscal Impact: Net state savings likely in the tens of millions of dollars annually, depending on implementation. Net county costs YES of likely a few million dollars annually.

ENGLISH PROFICIENCY.
MULTILINGUAL EDUCATION.
INITIATIVE STATUTE. Preserves 58 requirement that public schools ensure students obtain English language proficiency. Requires school districts to solicit parent/community input in developing language acquisition programs. Requires instruction to ensure English acquisition as rapidly and effectively as possible. Authorizes school districts to establish dual-language immersion

programs for both native and non-

Impact: No notable fiscal effect on

CORPORATIONS. POLITICAL SPENDING. FEDERAL 59 CONSTITUTIONAL PROTECTIONS. LEGISLATIVE ADVISORY

QUESTION. Asks whether California's elected officials should use their authority to propose and ratify an amendment to the federal Constitution overturning the United States Supreme Court decision in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission. Citizens United ruled that laws placing certain limits on political spending by corporations and unions are unconstitutional. Fiscal Impact: No direct fiscal effect on state or local governments.

Shall California's elected officials use all of their constitutional authority, including, but not limited to, proposing and ratifying one or more amendments to the United States Constitution, to overturn Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission (2010) 558 U.S. 310, and other applicable judicial precedents, to allow the full regulation or limitation of campaign contributions and spending, to ensure that all citizens, regardless of wealth, may express their views to one another, and to make clear that corporations should not have the same constitutional rights as human beings? NO

ADULT FILMS. CONDOMS. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS. 60 **INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Requires

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adult film performers to use condoms during filming of sexual intercourse. Requires producers to pay for performer vaccinations, testing, and medical examinations. Requires rs to post condom requirement at sites. Fiscal Impact: Likely reduction of state and local tax revenues of several million dollars annually. Increased state spending that could exceed \$1 million annually **YES** on regulation, partially offset by new NO

STATE PRESCRIPTION DRUG PURCHASES. PRICING STANDARDS. INITIATIVE 61 STATUTE. Prohibits state from

buying any prescription drug from a drug manufacturer at price over lowest price paid for the drug by United States Department of Veterans Affairs. Exempts managed care programs funded through Medi-Cal. Fiscal Impact: Potential for state savings of an unknown amount depending on (1) how the measure's implementation challenges are addressed and (2) the responses of drug manufacturers regarding the YES provision and pricing of their drugs. NO

DEATH PENALTY. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Repeals death penalty **62** and replaces it with life imprisonment without possibility of parole. Applies retroactively to existing death sentences. Increases the portion of life inmates' wages that may be applied to victim restitution. Fiscal Impact: Net ongoing reduction in state and county criminal justice costs of around \$150 million annually within a few years, although the impact could vary YES by tens of millions of dollars dépending on various factors.

FIREARMS. AMMUNITION SALES. **INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Requires background check and Department of Justice authorization to purchase

ammunition. Prohibits possession of largecapacity ammunition magazines. Establishes procedures for enforcing laws prohibiting firearm possession by specified persons. Requires Department of Justice's participation in federal National Instant Criminal Background Check System. Fiscal Impact: Increased state and local court and law enforcement costs, potentially in the tens of millions of dollars annually, related to a new court process for removing firearms from YES prohibited persons after they are

MARIJUANA LEGALIZATION. **INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Legalizes 64 marijuana under state law, for use by adults 21 or older. Imposes state taxes on sales and cultivation. Provides for industry licensing and establishes standards for

marijuana products. Allows local regulation and taxation. Fiscal Impact: Additional tax revenues ranging from high hundreds of millions of dollars to over \$1 billion annually, mostly dedicated to specific purposes. Reduced criminal justice costs of tens YES of millions of dollars annually.

CARRYOUT BAGS. CHARGES. **INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Redirects money collected by grocery and certain other retail stores through mandated sale of carryout bags. Requires stores to deposit bag sale proceeds into a

special fund to support specified environmental projects. Fiscal Impact: Potential state revenue of several tens of millions of dollars annually under certain circumstances, with the monies used to support certain YES environmental programs. NO

DEATH PENALTY. PROCEDURES. **INITIATIVE STATUTE.** Changes 66 procedures governing state court challenges to death sentences.

Designates superior court for initial petitions and limits successive petitions. Requires appointed attorneys who take noncapital appeals to accept death penalty appeals. Exempts prison officials from existing regulation process for developing execution methods. Fiscal Impact: Unknown ongoing impact on state court costs for processing legal challenges to death sentences. Potential prison savings YES in the tens of millions of dollars annually. NO

BAN ON SINGLE-USE PLASTIC BAGS. REFERENDUM. A "Yes"

vote approves, and a "No" vote rejects, a statute that prohibits grocery and other stores from providing customers single-use plastic or paper carryout bags but permits sale of recycled paper bags small fiscal effects on state and local governments, including a minor increase in state administrative costs YES and possible minor local government savings from reduced litter and waste

Santa Cruz City High School District

To upgrade local middle and high school classrooms, science labs, career training facilities, and technology infrastructure to support student achievement in math, science, engineering, English, social studies, visual/performing arts, technology, and skilled trades; acquire, renovate, construct/equip classrooms, sites/facilities; and improve school safety, security and disabled access; shall Santa Cruz City High School District issue \$140 million in bonds at legal interest rates, with independent citizen oversight, annual audits, and all funds benefitting local middle and high **BONDS YES** schools. **BONDS NO**

To improve the quality of education with funding that cannot be taken by the State; repair/replace leaky roofs; make health, safety and security improvements; replace deteriorating plumbing and sewer systems; improve student access to computers and modern technology; modernize/construct classrooms, restrooms and school facilities; and upgrade inadequate electrical systems; shall Soquel Union Elementary School District issue \$42,000,000 of bonds at legal interest rates, have an independent citizens' oversight committee, and have NO money used for administrative salaries? **BONDS YES**
