II. What to consider when identifying a photo

Format of the photo
Photographer
Captions on the photo
Background, location
Clothing, house, garden, car
Facial features
Your own genealogical research...dates, family groups, where living
Local and national history (place photo in historical context)

III. Formats of photos

Daguerreotype 1839-c.1860
Ambrotype 1854-c.1865
Tintype 1856-1900
Carte de Visite 1860-1870
Cabinet Card 1870s to late 19th century
Snapshots late 1880s...Brownie Box camera in 1900!

IV. Every photo tells a story

- Who owned the photo?
- Who took the picture?
- Who is in the picture?
- What is the event?
- When was it taken?
- Where was it taken?
- Why was it taken?

V. Look at the photo as though you have never seen it before Use clues to identify a photo

- Background...Location (Use Google Images)
- Building, house
- Garden
- Clothing
- Automobile

IX. Organization...Paper photos

- Organize photos by year
- Go through one box at a time
- Decide whether to toss, digitize, put in an album

X. Toss and scan

Keep one copy of each image

Ask yourself how many photos you need of a vacation or an event

Select the important pictures. Toss the others.

Get rid of blurry, over and under exposed pictures

Scan the ones you keep
